Roman Provincial Coins of Syria In 63 B.C., Syria was incorporated into the Roman Republic as a province following the success of Pompey the Great against the Parthians. In 135 A.D., after the defeat of the Bar Kokhba Revolt, Roman Syria and Judaea were merged into the province Syria Palaestina.

Syria was an early Roman province, annexed to the Roman Republic in 64 BC by Pompey in the Third Mithridatic War, following the defeat of Armenian King Tigranes the Great. During the early empire, the Roman army in Syria accounted for three legions with auxiliaries, [citation needed] they defended the border with Parthia .

During its peak, Antioch reached a population of 500,000 and was the third-largest city in the Roman empire. When Pompey reorganized the Near-East and created the Roman province of Syria in 64 BCE, Antioch, which had rebelled against the last Seleucid king, Antiochus XIII, became a free city and continued to issue its own coins.
